Washington, D.C., December 21, 2018 – Banana executives with Chiquita Brands who are now the subject of a major criminal investigation in Colombia were instrumental in making secret payments to Colombian guerrilla and paramilitary groups, according to an article and Web posting published today by National Security Archive senior analyst Michael

Q Take a very specific question. How did you know that time that ((b)(7)(C)) wasn't pocketing cash?

A That's a very valid question, and that's been my concern ((b)(7)) since day one, because the only person the requests funds and payments for guerillas is the head of security. No one ever knows who — or negotiates with the groups, except for himself. And that's been my, if you will my concern since day one;

The National Security Archive is publishing its findings in collaboration with <u>VerdadAbierta</u>, a longtime Ar partner that works to shed light on the roots of Colombia's conflict. The new publications synthesize infor drawn from public sources and a 48,000-page trove of corporate records obtained through the Archive's Freedom of Information Act lawsuit.
